Each shoebox you pack helps a local church around the world tell a child about Jesus, God's Greatest Gift. Many of them will grow in their faith and learn how to tell friends and family about Him

through our discipleship program called The Greatest Journey. In a new initiative, we are going island to island in the Pacific to take the Gospel to a half a million children over the next few years, as part of our commitment to "proclaim the Gospel to the whole creation" (Mark 16:15, ESV).

In sending the Gospel to the ends of the earth, we are also sharing God's Word with dozens of unreached people groups and going to hard-to reach places to make His Name known. This has resulted in more than 2 million children making decisions for Christ and over 1,000 churches being started in one year! For example, there's now a church in a remote village in Namibia among the Himba unreached people group. "Before we had never heard of Jesus," said Pastor Kuyelia, leader of the new church. "Now, we have abandoned witch doctors and seek God alone in prayer and worship." We're thankful for all those who have faithfully prayed for Operation Christmas Child, a Samaritan's Purse project.

You can join us in packing shoeboxes so that more children in the remote corners of the world can hear the Good News of the Gospel. May God bless you.

- #4 Make wise choices



Your child has already accomplished so much in such a short time. I'm so blessed to have each of your little ones for kindergarten this year!





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














Teacher Update: 2nd Grade

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
Teacher Update: 3rd Grade

We concluded our insect unit by sharing our imaginary insects with each of the K, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grade classes. One of our experiments involved planting stringless bean seeds in both light and dark conditions. Each day we were anxious to observe and record the change in the bean seeds and the growth of the plants. We have now begun our Forces and Machines Unit. In Chapter 4, we will be discovering different kinds of simple machines and how machines make work easier for us and others.

High School Updates

Just a quick overview of what the Junior and Senior High are doing in Mrs. Caldwell's classes. The 6th-8th graders are studying the early colonies and working on some geography to expose them to early American history. The 9th and 10th graders are reading an autobiography on the Life of Frederick Douglass in English and we are starting chapter 10 in American History covering American foreign affairs starting in the early 1900's. The 11th and 12th graders are reading, "Uncle Tom's Cabin" in English, and they just finished reading, "Machiavelli's, The Prince" for their World History class. In addition, there are several ongoing projects that the 9th-12th graders are working their way through this year. One is studying the history of the construction and implementation of the United States Constitution. Currently, we are studying the 55 men who attended the constitutional convention in 1787. The other project we are working on is under the heading, Urban Planning. The students from five different research teams have chosen seven sectors to study this year concerning urban planning. They are as follows: energy, education, law enforcement, housing, health care, entertainment, and the one we are currently studying, transportation. The students are researching possible ways to construct a transportation system for an urban setting. We will be pulling the research together. The end of October, the students will put a consolidated proposal together regarding transportation.

The 6th - 8th Bible students have just completed a survey of the four Gospel accounts culminating the study of The Gospel of John. We focused on John 20: 31 as the guide to this precious Gospel: "But these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in His name." We have also taken time to study the truths about the Holy Spirit. Ephesians 4:32 is the current memorization/meditation verse.

The 9/10th Bible students have continued to study the highly Christocentric book which is the letter to the Colossians. We have taken several classes to examine and apply Clossiassians 1: 9, 10 which is referred to as the Colossian's Cycle. This "cycle" is a prayer for Christians to know God's will through Scripture, gain wisdom and understanding through the Spirit in personal application, and respond in a way that is worthy of the LORD. Much class time continued to focus on the richness of Christ.

The 11/12th Apologetics class further examined the Teleological Argument for the existence of God. This simply consists of the logic based on the premise that every design has a designer and since the universe has a very complex design it requires a Designer. They discussed the anthropic principle that the universe is highly tuned to support life on earth. The fallacies of the naturalistic worldview were also discussed. The first units of the course have focused on the truth of the existence of God from logical propositions.

All the students have been respectful and cooperative. They are a blessing!

Although last year's end and this year's beginning have been challenging to say the least, the band is still managing to function at a high level. With the help of Puppy Pads for all brass players, doublelayered bell covers for clarinets, saxophones, trumpets and trombones, head-joint shields for flutes, and all percussionists masked, we are able to rehearse on a normal schedule.

This past week we gave mini-concerts for grades 3-4-5. The younger students are not allowed in the band room while we are playing, but they sat in the hallway and looked through the doors. The band played four pieces for them: "Fanfare Americana", by James Hosay, "Jublilations", by William Owens, "Acclamations" by Ed Huckeby, and the "Superman Theme, arr", by Mike Story. We are currently working on "Crossroads", by Michael Oare. In the next few weeks both the Jazz Band and The Bucket Drumming Ensemble will also give mini-concerts for grades 3-4-5. The Jazz Band will play "Fly Me To The Moon" and "C-Jam Blues", featuring several improvised solos by various students. The Buckets will do, "Avalanche", featuring a bell-duet on "Stars And Stripes Forever". One of the main reasons we are able to continue pretty much normally is the individualized lessons each student receives every week. Please monitor your child's practice at home and remember to sign his/her practice chart. Students in grades 6-12 need a minimum of 106 minutes per week to receive an A (93-100).

Elementary Art Class:


