The 6-8 grade Bible students continue to do a very good job surveying the New Testament. During the last few weeks we have discovered the key themes and high points of Paul's letters to the Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians and Colossians. Topics included the fruit of the Spirit, the Mystery of Christ, the mind of Christ, gratitude and several other themes. Our current memory passage is Ephesians 2:8,9.

The 9/10 grade Bible students continued to study and hopefully apply teachings from the book of Colossians and have discussed truths from the letter to Philemon. The big themes were God honoring speech and forgiveness. It is hoped that students will seek to have edifying speech and forgive others as the LORD would have us do.

The 11/12 grade Bible students have continued to examine the basics of Christians apologetics. After carefully studying the historicity and vital importance of the resurrection of Christ, students examined the deity of Christ: Jesus is God as is evident from fulfilled prophecy, I AM statements and direct and indirect claims by Christ and claims by the New Testament writers. Students are also reading, "More Than a Carpenter" by Josh McDowell.
