


Teacher Update: 3rd Grade

Grades 6-8

The death, burial and Resurrection of Christ was the focus of the first week of April. The students made the connection between the Old Testament Passover and the perfect Lamb of God, Jesus Christ. As the students looked back at the humble sacrifice of Jesus they were encouraged to reach out in love to serve others. Time was taken to review themes in Paul's epistles. Such themes included Christ's substitutionary death, unity in Christ, the Second Coming, and the supremacy of Christ.

Grades 9-10

Using Colossians as a point of truth along with related passages, students studied themes of encouragement, edification, personal purity, perseverance, and forgiveness. We took time to pray for the persecuted church around the world and wrote cards of encouragement based on 1 Thessalonians 5:11. Students were clearly shown the vital, historical and resounding truth of the Resurrection.

Grades 11-12

The Apologetics class reviewed the vital ramifications of the Resurrection and how to address those who might deny that it even occurred. They also studied the fact that Jesus fulfilled prophecy and often referred to characters and passages from what we call the Old Testament. They explored the meaning and background of the development of the Canon of Scripture. Several days were dedicated to praying for persecuted Christians around the world. The students all satisfactorily completed part one of their Apologetics final.

Note: Prayer and personal application of Scripture have been emphasized in all classes.
